Listen with your ear to the ground, follow the Greenstone Line of the historic waterfront.

Purchase of 65,000 hectares was agreed on the condition that one tenth of the area be reserved for Māori. Of the 43 single acre plots along Lambton Quay - Māori received just one.



Every day prisoners marched from the Te Aro School site in irons. At the Mount Cook Prison Factory each brick made was stamped with an arrow. These bricks were used in many local buildings.

Original sections in Wellington were one acre each. Between 1841-1870 these were divided


